What you are about to read was woven throughout 2025.



We kept weaving—even when it was not easy. We wove together, with patience and care, in a context that tested the movement, our allies, and the reproductive rights agenda across the region.

It was a year marked by funding cuts that threatened the sustainability—and in some cases, the very existence—of our allies, the broader movement, and the reproductive rights agenda in Latin America and the Caribbean. Even *when threads tangled, tightened into knots, or began to fray, we kept weaving.*


In the face of entrenched power, the rise of anti-rights movements, and far-right governments, *weaving together became a political act*—a deliberate choice to resist fragmentation, competition, and isolation, even as the context pushed us toward rupture.




2025 marked the conclusion of our Theory of Change implementation period. *We did not arrive with definitive answers or finished paths, but with lessons learned, experiences gained, and new threads ready to be woven into what comes next.*

We supported processes that moved from the local to the collective and regional, strengthening a a common fabric built together”. This work required time, care, and intention.



 We wove together to sustain the conditions that make access to sexual and reproductive rights possible in Latin America and the Caribbean.

 We wove so that women and all people who can become pregnant can make reproductive decisions with autonomy.

 We wove so that reproductive justice is, in practice, a right.

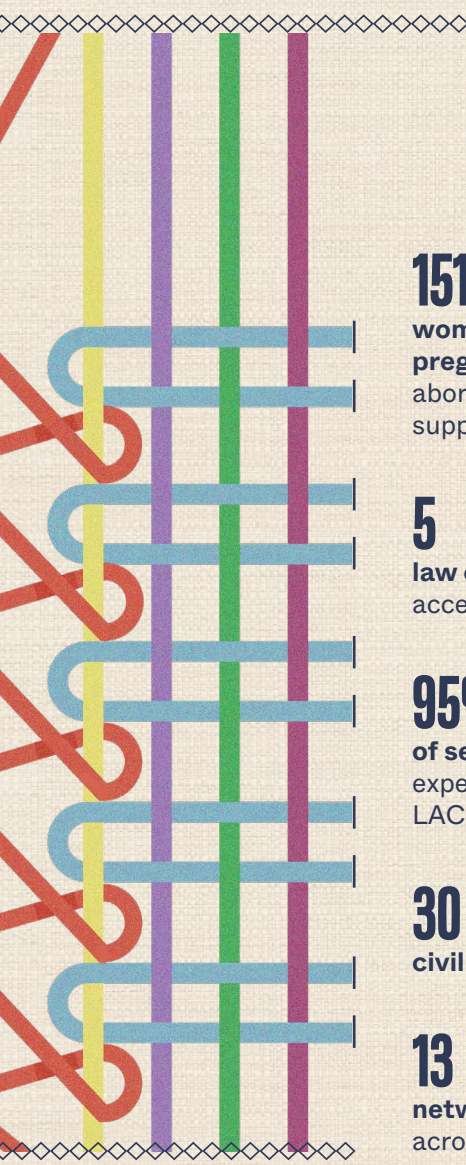

Ipas LAC is a regional organization and part of a global non-profit network working across the Americas, Africa, and Asia to ensure that all women and people who can become pregnant can make reproductive choices freely and with dignity.



We actively work in **Argentina, Colombia, Chile, Costa Rica, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, and Nicaragua**, partnering with allied organizations, institutions, and key stakeholders to prevent unintended pregnancies and expand access to contraception and safe abortion.

To build resilient ecosystems for safe abortion and contraception services through a comprehensive approach that engages all sectors, institutions, and communities.

A world where all people have the right and the ability to make decisions about their sexuality and reproductive health.

Since 2021, we have collectively built our Theory of Change, which guided our work through 2025. We chose to work with care and precision, connecting local and regional processes to strengthen resilient ecosystems for safe abortion and contraception.

This work was shaped through different "stitches"—some visible, others not; some firm, others flexible—but all essential to sustaining and strengthening Ipas LAC's work.

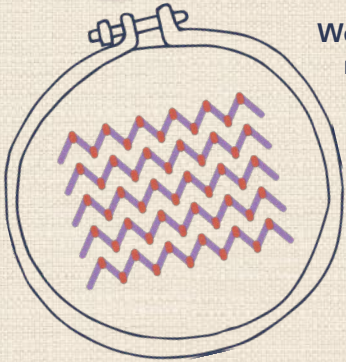

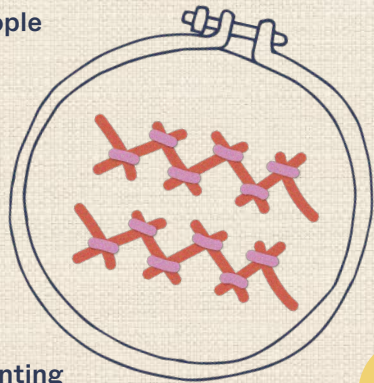

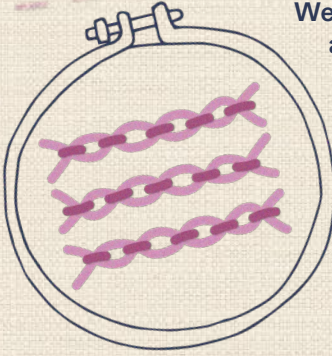
We work to ensure that decision-makers design, adopt, and oversee the implementation of laws, public policies, and budgets that guarantee access to contraception and safe abortion for all women and people who can become pregnant.

We work so that women and people who can become pregnant across Latin America and the Caribbean have access to information and social support that enable them to exercise autonomy and agency in decisions about their sexuality and reproductive lives, free from stigma and discrimination. This includes a strong focus on preventing unintended pregnancies and expanding access to abortion services.



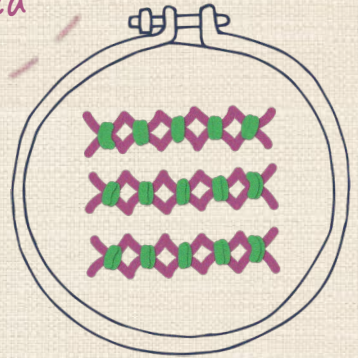

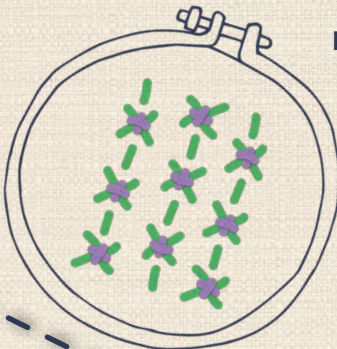
We strengthen pathways to safe abortion and contraception across the region, working to ensure that services are accessible, high-quality, acceptable, timely, and affordable.

Weaving from a place of care and self-care has been a collective and political decision—to sustain life, rebuild social fabrics, and respond to contexts shaped by criminalization and inequality. From this place, Ipas LAC has supported processes and stories that center dignity, safety, and autonomy for the people and communities we work with.



What follows are some of the achievements from this period—both visible and invisible stitches—that show how, even in challenging contexts, the fabric of reproductive justice continues to grow stronger.

THREADS FROM AROUND OUR REGION



Stronger policies, laws, and financing



Strengthening legislators' understanding of abortion as essential health care

In a context of regulatory setbacks and growing anti-rights offensives, we launched *Navigating the Green Wave*, a strategic digital space designed to strengthen public debate and decision-making around abortion regulation in Mexico.

The platform brought together legislators from Guanajuato, Nuevo León, Jalisco, Yucatán, Mexico City, and Morelos, with the aim of strengthening their role in shaping public discourse and policy decisions.



Through this process, legislators deepened their understanding of abortion as essential health care and strengthened their ability to advocate for this perspective—both in legislative debates and in the media.

Through these alliances, *Navigating the Green Wave* continues to position itself as a unique space for weaving progress toward more just, evidence-based regulatory frameworks centered on the rights of women and people who can become pregnant.



Positioning the reproductive rights agenda in regional spaces

The IV Regional Conference on Women, held in Mexico City in August 2025, was a **key opportunity to influence regional agendas, strengthen civil society participation, and advance critical debates in a context marked by democratic backsliding and the rise of anti-rights movements.**

In this space, we facilitated the dialogue *“The Right to Decide and Care: Risks in a Context of Regional Democratic Backsliding,”* which brought together **more than 50 participants.** The discussion explicitly linked the right to care with reproductive justice, drawing on standards established by the Inter-American Court of Human Rights and highlighting the importance of both rights in contexts of exclusion, inequality, and democratic regression.



Through this engagement, Ipas LAC advanced an integrated perspective that positions reproductive autonomy and the right to care as interdependent rights, reinforcing their relevance in policy and normative debates as essential to the defense of democracy and human rights in the region.

Facilitating regional dialogue and exchange

As part of a regional advocacy strategy aimed at influencing policy frameworks and decision-making spaces, we participated in key forums such as the 55th General Assembly of the Organization of American States (OAS), held in Antigua and Barbuda.

This Assembly was particularly significant as the first held in the Caribbean, marking the beginning of the mandate of the first Caribbean Secretary General of the OAS and the first woman to serve as Assistant Secretary General.

Our participation included facilitating multi-stakeholder dialogues and actively engaging with diverse actors to share strategies for countering authoritarian and fundamentalist agendas in the region, while highlighting their impact on equality, gender, and diversity.





Co-organizing a strategic dialogue with the Supreme Court of Honduras

We co-organized and facilitated a dialogue between members of the Supreme Court of Honduras and civil society organizations in Mexico, creating space for a strategic exchange on the current context of justice systems in both countries and the use of a gender perspective in judicial decision-making.

This meeting took place within the framework of the Honduran Justice Operators' Study Tour in Mexico, organized by Optio and the Institute for Comparative Studies in Criminal and Social Sciences. It contributed to strengthening the exchange of experiences and approaches between judicial actors and civil society around regional human rights standards.



Generating key evidence to respond to anti-rights movements

We contributed to the development of the report [From Spain to the World: The Global Projection of the Spanish Far Right Against Sexual and Reproductive Rights](#), published in 2025 in collaboration with our Catalan partners at L'Associació de Drets Sexuals i Reproductius and Brazilian partners at Sexuality Policy Watch.

The study **analyzes how far-right and anti-rights actors originating in Spain have expanded their influence through transnational networks, documenting their impact across six case study countries: Argentina, Chile, Guatemala, El Salvador, Kenya, and Spain. It also examines the role of other key countries—such as Mexico, Brazil, the United States, and Hungary—within the global anti-rights ecosystem.**

Targeted at allied organizations, governments, and donors, the report aims to strengthen local and transnational advocacy efforts in response to extremist agendas. This initiative contributes directly to our efforts to anticipate, understand, and counter actors that threaten the rule of law and, in turn, sexual and reproductive rights globally.

Strengthening capacities with partner organizations

Our Community-Based Work Model is grounded in the understanding that capacities are built collectively—through the knowledge, practices, and experiences of partner organizations and networks.

As part of this approach, in 2025 we supported capacity-strengthening processes aimed at sustaining community action, collective care, and strategic decision-making.

Within this framework, we facilitated key spaces for exchange and learning, including:

- **a digital security workshop** for organizations in Central America and Mexico, focused on strengthening collective digital safety practices and tools to protect activism in high-risk contexts; and
- **training on results measurement methodologies**, supporting organizations in Central America to strengthen their ability to collect, analyze, and report data, enabling more strategic decision-making and stronger accountability.

Through practical, methodology-driven sessions, we also accompanied our partners in the design and implementation of community-based interventions—strengthening more autonomous, sustainable processes rooted in local social change.

Developing people-centered information resources

As part of our strategy to strengthen enabling social norms and agency among women and people with the capacity for pregnancy, in 2025 we developed and disseminated resources designed to support informed decision-making about safe abortion, grounded in rights, care, and autonomy.

 Expanding access pathways through pharmacy networks

We continued expanding our work with pharmacies to ensure that access to abortion medications is affordable, stigma-free, and timely.

During this period, [our pharmacy access map in Mexico](#) grew to include **914 independent pharmacies across 10 states.**

This digital tool has helped expand safe and reliable access pathways to abortion. We also developed an advanced search feature through [Tableau](#), integrating location, address, and medication availability to enable more precise and timely access.

 Expanding access to information through digital tools

As part of our strategy to expand access to reliable information and safe support pathways, in 2025 we strengthened and scaled digital tools designed to support people experiencing violence, mobility, and restricted access to services.

Te Acompaño, a chatbot focused on sexual violence response and access to safe abortion for migrants in Mexico, registered:

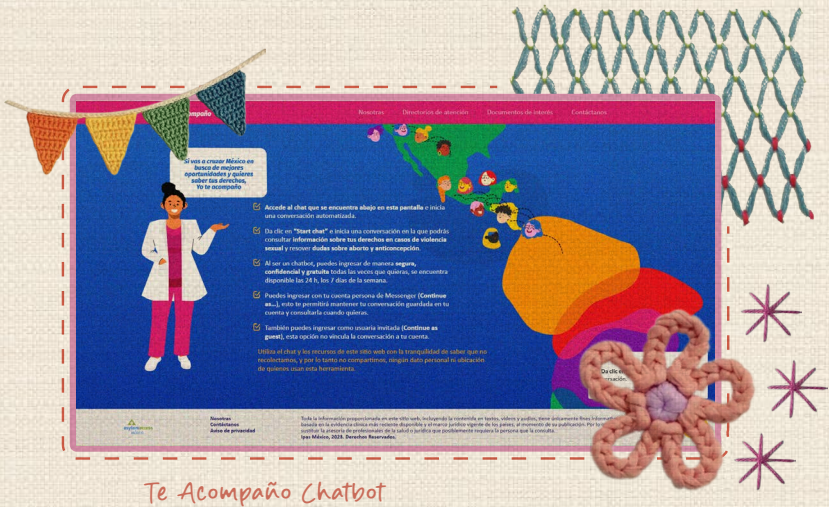
- **21,851 visits**
- **2,494 interactions**
- **1,871 users reached**

Most users were located in Chiapas, Tabasco, Mexico City, Yucatán, and Quintana Roo—highlighting the relevance of this tool in key migration corridors.

Sofia, our safe abortion chatbot, recorded:

- **14,604 visits from 11,018 users**, primarily in Brazil, Mexico, and Peru
- **6,187 consultations**

Sofia continues to strengthen its role as a safe, confidential, and timely access point for informed reproductive decision-making.

Launching Aborto Acompañado en Centroamérica (ACA)

We supported the development of **Aborto Acompañado en Centroamérica (Aborto ACA)**, a platform that connects women and people seeking abortion in Central America with accompaniment networks in Mexico.



This model provides a critical indirect access pathway that prioritizes the safety of both those seeking abortion and those providing support, in contexts shaped by criminalization and legal restrictions.

✳️ *Advancing visibility and dignity in abortion care
at later stages*

In coordination with the Latin American Consortium Against Unsafe Abortion (CLACAI), we presented the [Guidelines for Best Practices in Induced Abortion Care from 20 Weeks of Pregnancy](#) at its Congress in November 2025.



The launch brought together more than 400 participants—including health-care professionals, civil society organizations, government decision-makers, accompaniment networks, and activists—who welcomed this landmark document, which affirms that abortion care is valid and necessary at all stages of pregnancy.

Ipas LAC also presented the guidelines at the FIGO World Congress in Cape Town, South Africa. **The session generated meaningful exchange with participants, who showed strong interest in the regional collaboration behind the guidelines.**

This publication is **a key tool to challenge stigma and discrimination around abortion at later stages**, placing care, dignity, and autonomy at the center. It is the fifth document in “Los tiempos del Aborto” initiative, which seeks to expand, dignify, and improve abortion care across all stages of pregnancy.

Expanding safe abortion services through collaboration with health-care providers

We advanced efforts to strengthen the capacities of health-care providers in Argentina, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Honduras, Guatemala, and Mexico.

This work focused on supporting the implementation of national policies and guidelines to improve the availability, quality, and acceptability of services.

We also promoted the **exchange of experiences and best practices among health-care providers and public authorities**, while continuing supervision and quality assurance processes through our Graduation Strategy and Centers of Best Practice.

One example of this work was strengthening advocacy and communication capacities among health-care providers in Chile, in the context of a new governmental initiative to decriminalize abortion up to 14 weeks. This process helped bridge clinical expertise with legal and policy frameworks, enabling more informed participation of health-care providers in public debate.

* Generating and sharing high-impact research to improve policies and practice

We strengthened our commitment to producing and disseminating rigorous, regionally grounded scientific evidence.

In 2025, we published six peer-reviewed articles in international journals, contributing to public debate and decision-making in sexual and reproductive health at both regional and global levels.

Through the analysis of large datasets, prospective studies, and policy evaluations in Mexico, the United States, Colombia, and Argentina, we generated critical evidence to:

- challenge persistent myths about abortion
- support more accessible, people-centered care models
- highlight the structural impact of migration policies on reproductive health
- document territorial inequalities that deepen access gaps

Our added value lies in connecting methodological rigor with a reproductive justice lens—linking data with context and transforming academic findings into practical tools for advocacy, policy reform, and health system strengthening across Latin America and the Caribbean.

* Article 1.

Examines complication rates in abortion-related care in public hospitals in Mexico, showing that the vast majority of cases involve no complications and challenging the overestimation of abortion risk.

* Article 2.

Explores how U.S. migration policies influence contraceptive use, demonstrating that more inclusive environments improve access to effective methods among women of Mexican origin.

* Article 3.

Compares first-trimester medication abortion adherence between telemedicine and in-person care in Colombia, showing similarly high outcomes and confirming the effectiveness of both modalities.

* Article 4.

Analyzes the expansion of access to manual vacuum aspiration following legal reform in Argentina, confirming its safety and effectiveness even at later gestational stages.

* Article 5.

Examines the use of sexual and reproductive health services among women of Mexican origin in the United States, highlighting the critical role of public clinics for populations with limited access to social security.

* Article 6.

Assesses how the COVID-19 pandemic deepened inequalities in access to abortion services in Mexico

We also participated actively in the International Conference on Family Planning in Colombia, with a strong presence that included:

- two flash sessions on quality of care and Centers of Best Practice
- three oral presentations on technological innovations, SRHR needs of migrant women, and in-person vs. telemedicine care
- a poster on the impact of abortion decriminalization in Mexico
- a panel on primary-level abortion care in Mexico, Argentina, and Colombia

This engagement helped expand the international visibility of our work and strengthen advocacy efforts in public policy and health programs, positioning evidence as a key tool to improve access, quality, and acceptability of services.

* Building a regional network of providers for later gestational abortion care

We convened the first regional meeting of health-care providers working on abortion at later stages in Latin America.

This space brought together approximately 25 professionals from Argentina, Ecuador, Honduras, Colombia, Chile, El Salvador, Mexico, Bolivia, and Guatemala to exchange experiences, lessons learned, and challenges in providing care at this stage.



A fabric of change

The Las Higueras Hospital in Chile became the first health facility in the country certified by Ipas as a Center of Best Practice in comprehensive abortion care.

In addition to providing high-quality abortion and contraception services, the hospital now serves as a training hub for health-care providers, promoting multidisciplinary teamwork and continuous improvement in care.

Strengthening and expanding our digital presence

Despite a digital environment shaped by algorithmic censorship and systemic restrictions on abortion and contraception content, we sustained and grew Ipas LAC's digital community.





We reached nearly **14,000 new followers**, building a community of over **125,000 people** and generating approximately **300,000 interactions**.

This growth was driven by an agile, context-aware strategy combining real-time content production, political analysis, and strong coordination across teams.

Key highlights included:

- content on abortion decriminalization in Guanajuato, reaching nearly **1 million views on Instagram**
- TikTok content on self-managed abortion that reached new audiences despite platform restrictions, with three videos surpassing **1 million views**
- our **International Women's Day campaign**, which combined on-the-ground activation, partnerships with content creators, and high-engagement digital strategies

These efforts consolidated our digital strategy as a key tool for shaping narratives and expanding access to evidence-based information.

Positioning Ipas LAC in key international spaces

We actively participated in strategic global spaces such as EDGE, Central American Donor Forum, and International Conference on Family Planning, with the aim of positioning our regional work, strengthening relationships with donors and partners, and contributing to global conversations on sexual and reproductive rights from a Latin American perspective.

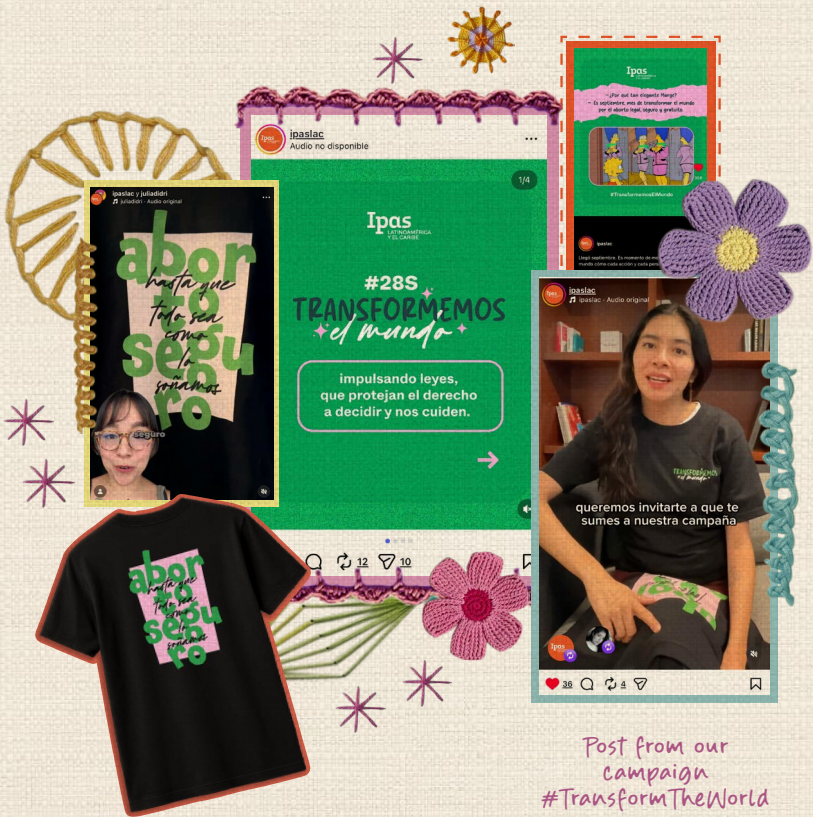
- These spaces allowed us to:
- share regional insights and lessons learned
- exchange strategies in increasingly complex contexts
- strengthen partnerships critical for institutional sustainability

They also served as platforms to communicate who we are, what we do, and why our work matters—opening new opportunities for funding, collaboration, and long-term partnerships.

* Launching the #TransformTheWorld fundraising campaign

We designed and launched the #TransformTheWorld campaign as an effort to explore new fundraising approaches while telling the story of our work in a more accessible and hopeful way.

The campaign aimed to connect with new audiences, center the stories of change we support, and strengthen a narrative that invites people to contribute, sustain, and believe in collective transformation.

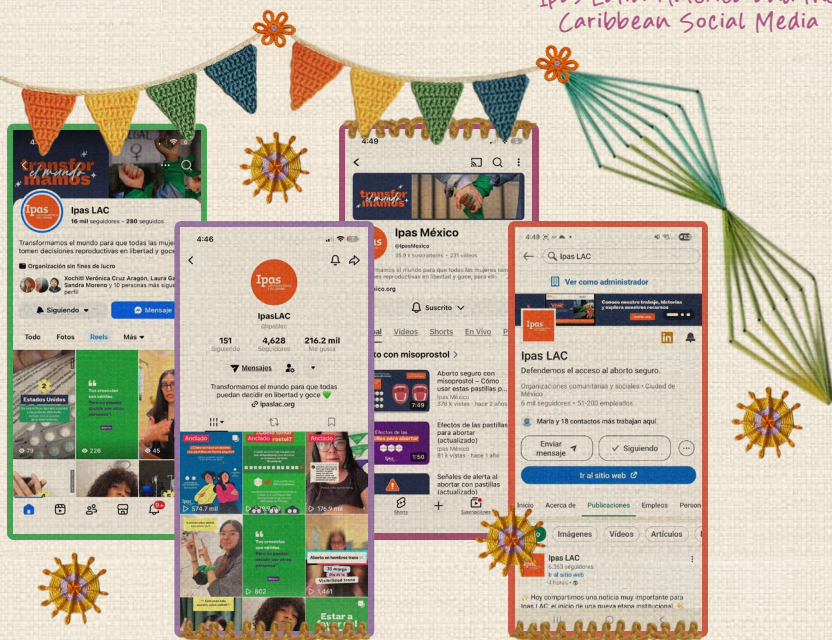

Strengthening and renewing our governance

In 2025, we completed the integration of Ipas LAC's new Assembly, composed of highly recognized leaders in the region: Edurne Cárdenas (Argentina), Sofia Regalado (Mexico), Pearl Friedberg (United States), and Paola Yañez (Bolivia).

Their incorporation strengthened the organization's strategic vision, bringing diverse perspectives, technical expertise, and a strong commitment to reproductive justice.

As a direct result of this strengthened governance structure, we completed the selection process for our new Executive Director, Diana Moreno (Colombia).

This process ensured leadership that combines political vision, people-centered management, and regional coordination experience—**marking a key moment in consolidating Ipas LAC's role as a regional organization capable of driving strategic and operational processes with coherence, transparency, and results.**

Strengthening institutional sustainability

We successfully completed all fiscal, legal, and administrative requirements in Mexico, where Ipas LAC is registered.

This milestone ensured operational continuity, strengthened transparency, and improved internal efficiency.

We were also recognized as a leading organization within the Ipas network and invited to share our experience with other teams—reflecting our institutional maturity and commitment to strengthening shared standards and best practices.

Launching the Sustainability and Creative Strategy Unit

In 2025, we took a strategic step by **creating and consolidating the Sustainability and Creative Strategy Unit**.

This decision responded to a key insight: doing strong programmatic work is not enough—we must also communicate it with clarity, purpose, and strategic intent to sustain it over time.

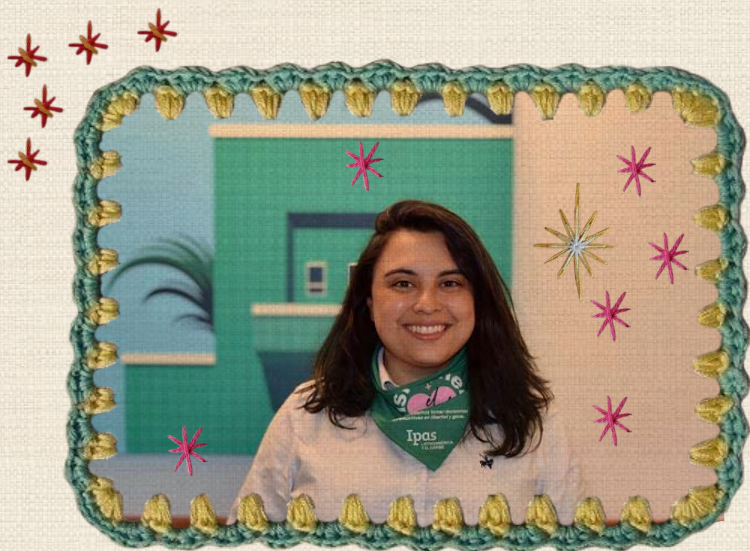
By bringing together fundraising and communications under one integrated strategy, we strengthened how we tell our story and align our priorities.

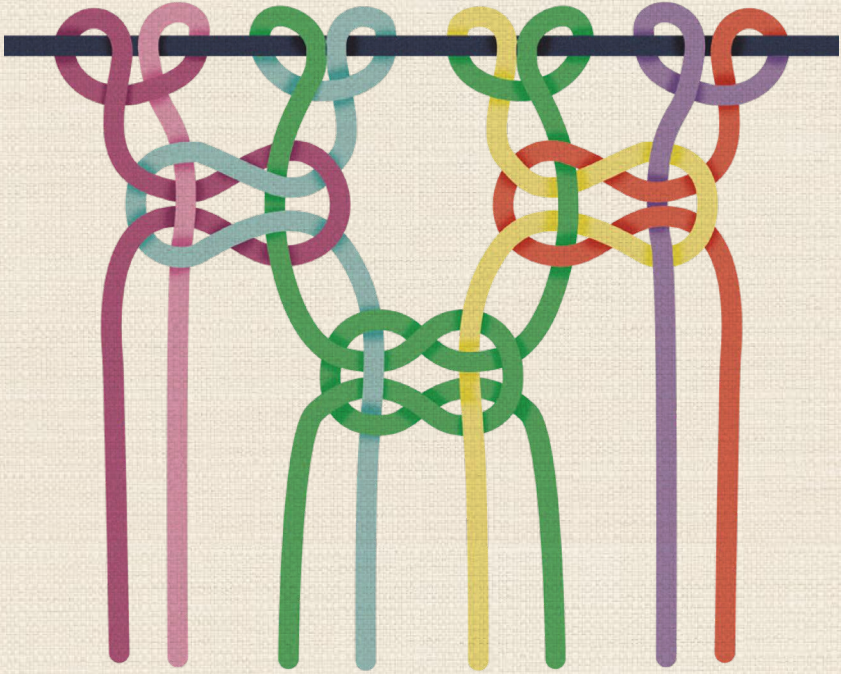

THE FINANCIAL FABRIC



At Ipas LAC, every resource is a thread woven with care, ethics, and a feminist perspective.

Our financial management is grounded in accountability, transparency, and a commitment to mobilizing and sharing resources with our partners, organizations, and networks leading change in their communities.

In 2025, 94.3% of our resources were allocated to programmatic activities, and 5.7% to operational costs—reflecting a conscious decision to ensure that every investment strengthens a more just, resilient, and sustainable ecosystem for reproductive justice in the region.
